1912 Stockholm

The fifth of the Modern Olympics saw the birth of the games as we know them today. For the first time since Athens they were held apart from any exposition and were no longer in the shadow of another event. The games were publicized by Sweden by cancels, official postal cards and vignettes.


The continuous roller cancel used domestically on a postcard dated March 24, 1912.

Card No. 91 showing the Swedish gymnasts competing in the flexicon exercises. They went on to win the gold.




1912 Stockholm

The Team, Combined All Around, Free System was competed on July 10th. Card No. 120 showing the German gymnasts competing on the parallel bars.




Card No. 156 showing the Finnish gymnasts competing on the parallel bars. The Finns took the silver medal.




1912 Stockholm Jim Thorpe

At the 1912 games in Stockholm the King of Sweden declared to Native American, Jim Thorpe, "You, Sir, are the greatest athlete in the World." Thorpe had just won the inaugural Olympic decathlon, as well as. The pentathlon, fourth in the high jump, and seventh in the long jump. Prior to the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Oklahoma decided to honor their favorite son. First, tiny Prague, Oklahoma honored it favorite son.




Also the World Series of Philately show, OKPEX, celebrated their Olympic Athletes with a cachet featuring Jim Thorpe.
