31 Dec. 1935: - An Imperial Airways three engined Short S.8 Calcutta old plane, on its way from Greece to Alexandria, Egypt, tried to land there but due to lack of fuel, it fell into the and sea sank. 12 passengers and crewmen were killed but captain and two passengers were rescued after five hours by a British destroyer "Brilliant". 390 Kgs of salvaged mail were forwarded with many different cachets/labels.
