Tibet: Very Rare Shiny Enamel printing of the 1tr Carmine (Scott #5c) This is one of the Great Rarities of Tibetan Philately! Often called "the error of colour" it is printed in the colour of the 2/3tr. In all likelihood, printed in the early 1930s they remained "undiscovered" by the philatelic world until found by Waterfall in the 1950s. "I first noted this when I found a used block of four of a Rose-Carmine stamp. Looking for the POTSAGE error which is always found on one stamp at least of a 2/3tr block of four - and not finding one, I thought this to be a forgery until I noticed the distinctive bottle like character of the 1tr. This set up a real search among the Tibetan stockists, (there were a few in those days). H.W.R. Clarke was amazed when I pointed out two odds in his collection, amongst his 2/3trs. Since then two or three sheets have turned up - and they are extremely rare in sheet form." (Waterfall, 1965) The above sheet was purchased in Kalimpong, India from the family of "Tsarong Shape" who had been in charge of the Tibetan mint in the 1930s. This sheet is possibly Waterfall's #78, though A.C. Waterfall had so few examples to work with and compare it to, it is impossible to be sure. The sheet is in VF condition. It is cut fairly close, but we know that many printings were sold in this form by the Post Office. (See Williamson Collection, N.G. Rhodes, Postal Himal #36, 1983). The design may not appear to be clear, but "the enamel paint was a porr material for printing stamps, and usually resulted in a rather messy or blotchy print, obliterating the finer details of te design." (E.A. Smythies, 1956). All of the Shiny 1tr are extremely rare - even singles command very high prices. (Cat. \$300 x 12) A Very Rare Sheet!

It is now know that the plate was produced at the same time as the other five values of the set, but as such a high values of the set, but as such a high value was not needed at this time it was not printed. In 1950, it was introduced for use with the short-lived wireless telegraph system. There were at least four distinctive printings and the stamp can be found Mint and Used (with postal cancels and with the seven line wireless telegraph cancel). Not a great deal of care was taken in the printing of this value and most examples are a little smudgy.


