armistice in June 1919 and the war weary British, threatened with unrest in India, agreed. They signed the Treaty of Rawalpinidi on 8th August. This gave Afghanistan complete independence.


The Rawalpindi Treaty with Britain was reaffirmed in November 1921 when Afghanistan accepted the 1893 Durand Line as the international border and agreed to exchange diplomatic representatives.

So the current crop of fearful usurpers in 1978 may have considered this could be an object reminding citizens of a successful overthrow of rebels, which could be repeated.
