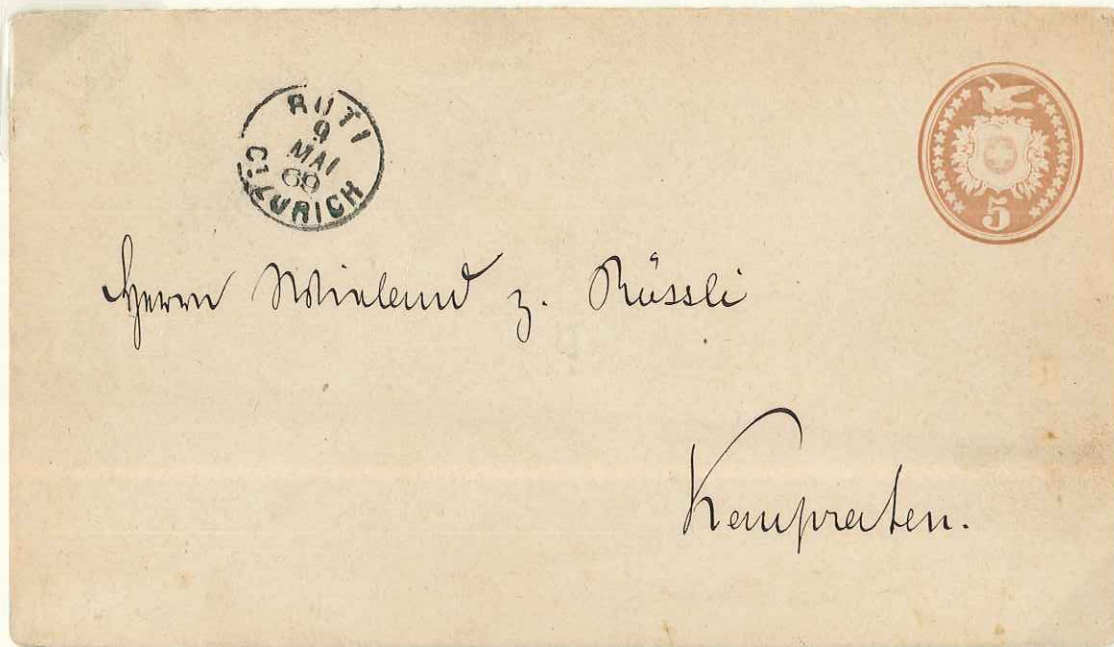


## 1867-68 Issue

### Intended Uses

### Local Letter, Non-Local Letter

Not necessary for postal clerks to cancel imprinted stamps since they were instructed not to accept already-used envelopes or cut-out stamps.



5c/10gr local letter going up to 9.6km (2-hour walk measured in straight line). Ruti to Kempraten, May 9, 1869. Rate of July 1, 1862-Aug. 31, 1871.

10c/10gr non-local letter, going more than 9.6km. Horgen to Oetwil near Stäfa, with **first day postmark on July 1, 1867. Only three recorded examples**, all on 10c envelopes. Rate of July 1, 1862-Aug. 31, 1871.

## 1867-68 Issue

Intended Uses

Letters to German States and Italy

The 25c envelope paid the rate to the German States, Austrian-Hungarian Empire and via direct exchange to Belgium, The Netherlands and Great Britain. The 30c envelope paid the rate to France and Italy



25c/15gr international letter. Winterthur to Lindau, Bavaria, **German States**, Sept. 9, 1869. Incorrectly marked "RL" for 10c reduced postage for *Rayon Limitrophe* (border zone) letter between towns within 52½km of border. Paid to Destination. Rate of Sept. 1, 1868-June 30, 1875.



30c/10gr international letter. Lausanne to Venice, **Italy**, Jan. 23, 1870. Paid to Destination. Rate of July 1, 1862-June 30, 1875.



## 1867-68 Issue

Used for Other Rates

Heavy Non-Local Letter, Cash Collection Notice

The postage rate for letters weighing more than 10gr  
up to 250gr was twice the basic rate for lighter letters.



20c/10-250gr non-local letter. Basel to Burgdorf, June 13, 1868. **Postage due formula** of July 1, 1862-Aug. 31, 1871: prepaid rate (20c) + penalty (10c) – payment (10c) = 20c due. Underpaid handstamp: *Affr*(anchissement). *Insuf*(fisant).

**Official**, non-local, cash collection letter. Fribourg to Estavayer, Apr. 16, 1869. **Free of 10c postage but required to pay for additional postal service.** Fee of 10c to collect 1fr70c. Penal citation to records office of Court of Justice.
