


'UITENHAGE C.G.H. APR 1892'

Cover to Uitenhage Cape Colony with KURUMAN numeral cancellor '534' and CDS in blue.


Cover bears 1891 Provisional 2d bisse Ovpt. British Bechuanaland in typeset print (SG.32).

The earliest usage for SG.32 was JA 12 92 from VRYBURG. The above Cover bears the earliest use of this stamp from KURUMAN.


Backstamped VRYBURG APR 16 92 and the train cancellation 'MIDLAND T.P.O. DOWN' (Travelling Post Office).

1888 (Jan.) 1d brown on buff card (G.B. 1883 issue) from A.J. Gould, kuruman, with message in Tswana. Transit VRYBURG OC 16 91 and KIMBERLEY OC 17 91. The railway had been opened to Wyburg in December 1890 and was under construction to Platfeling.



Kuruman was the headquarters of Robert Moffat from 1821. A post office was opened on 28<sup>th</sup> May 1866. The datestamp remained in use for several years after annexation in late 1895 and certainly up to the start of the Boer War in 1899.




Cover from Kuruman dated JY 2 90 bearing 1887 Unappropriated Die 2d pale dull Lilac and black (SG. IIa) to Cape Town. TAUNGS (JY 5 90) and KIMBERLEY (JY 6 90) transit with Cape Town arrival. The letter was routed to the rail head at Taungs. The track to Vryburg was not opened until December 1890.

Enclosure: 'I enclose a money order for 8/- in payment for the making of a broach and postage on same. Yours very sincerely Barrilarf (May)
