

CIRCULAR DELIVERY COMPANIES

"For thirty years after the great postal reform of 1840, the British Post Office turned a deaf ear to appeals for a reduced rate of postage for printed papers and circulars. And so private enterprise stepped in. In 1865 Robert Brydone formed the first of the Circular Delivery Companies, undertaking to deliver circulars within the boundaries of Edinburgh and Leigh for a farthing each. This service was successful, but when Brydone started extending his operations to London and other cities, and there was even a hint of a National Circular Delivery Company, the Post Office instituted legal proceedings as a result of which the companies' activities were suppressed as an infringement of the State postal monopoly. In their four-year career the companies issued various local stamps; these are an interesting specialist study but in genuine used condition, especially on cover are rare. As a direct result of the companies' enterprise, the Post Office heeded the demand for cheaper postage in 1870, and in that year the first 1/2d stamp was issued to meet the new reduced rate for printed paper."

The Exhibit

The exhibit shows examples of stamps from all the Circular Delivery Companies. There are very considerable variations in size, paper and perforation types among the stamps and the exhibit attempts to illustrate many of these variations, very often with mint blocks. Some of the more outstanding errors or faults are shown. Amongst these is Liverpool with blank impression, London and District with a row of farthing stamps at the top of a block of halfpenny stamps, and an Edinburgh and Leith unrecorded imperforate block. Stamps with blue crayon marks were the work of stamp dealer W.S.Lincoln who thought he could not sell uncanceled copies of these stamps. There are write ups on pages detailing where changes to the Companies occurred.

CIRCULAR DELIVERY COMPANIES

Edinburgh & Leith Company

The first company set up by Robert Brydone was the Edinburgh and Leith Circular Delivery Company which included Edinburgh & Leith Parcel Delivery Company. The first stamps for these companies appeared in October 1865. Despite good response from the public, towards the end of 1866 Robert became bankrupt and his father James took over the business. It is very probable that James Brydone, who was a printer, had been printing the stamps for the companies all along.

Robert Brydone solved his financial affairs in Edinburgh, and then moved to London. Late in 1866 he formed the London Circular Delivery Company. The first stamps were issued in September 1866 on thick soft paper, all imperforate. In April 1867 another company was formed the Metropolitan Circular Delivery Company. The two companies soon amalgamated and were managed by Manuel Eyre.



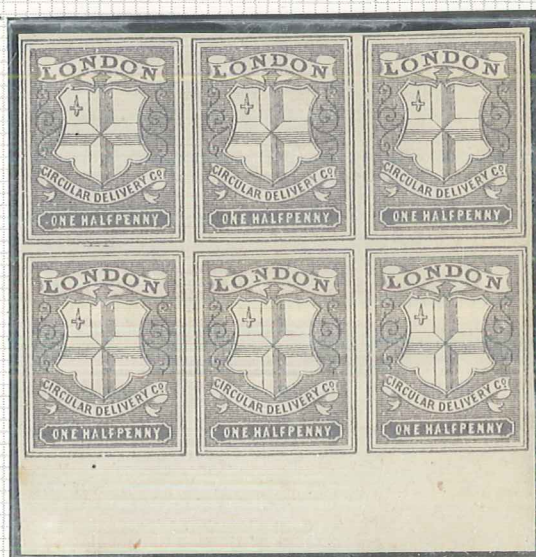

The halfpenny deep dull purple on thick paper without watermark was issued in September 1866. The farthing deep blue and the halfpenny dull purple were printed on hard wove paper with a papermakers watermark and issued in March 1867.

London & Metropolitan Circular Delivery Company

Metropolitan Circular Delivery Company

The Metropolitan Circular Delivery Company merged with the London Circular Delivery Company very soon after its formation and traded under the joint name under the management of Manuel Eyre. Stamps were issued on two types of paper

Glasgow Circular Delivery Company

James Brydone, Robert's father formed a second delivery company in Glasgow, and stamps were produced at the end of 1866. Strangely no advertisements have been found in the local newspapers for the company although, in the fight against the Post Office it was raised that Inland Revenue in Glasgow had used the company to deliver Tax Demand forms. The Glasgow stamps were the only ones to be printed on laid paper.

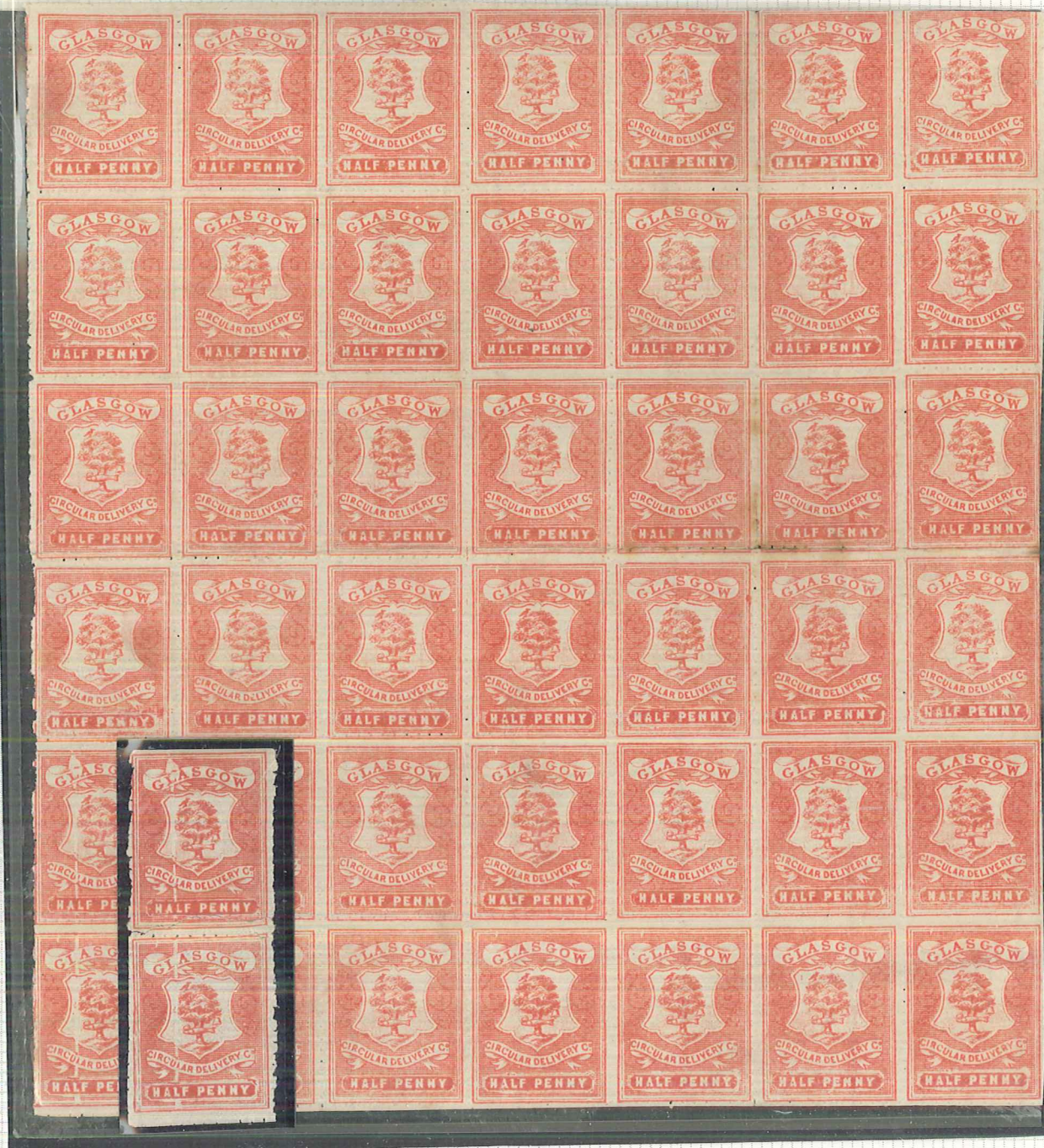

Liverpool Circular Delivery Company

There is no trace of this company in the street directory or local newspapers in 1867. It is possible that these stamps were prepared for use in Liverpool but because of the impending Post Office action, the stamps were never used.

National Circular Delivery Company

The National Circular Delivery Company was formed to deliver bulk circulars handed in in London, to other cities in which there were associated companies. Four values of stamps were involved, all perforated 13.

Dundee and Aberdeen Circular Delivery Companies

There appears to be no evidence that either of these two companies ever used their stamps. Only two stamps each, a farthing and a halfpenny, were produced by the companies. Of these, only the one halfpenny of Aberdeen is not very scarce.

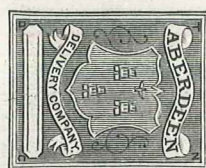
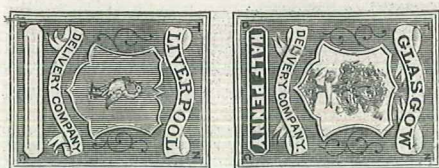

Clark & Co. Edinburgh

Little is known about this company which was formed in Edinburgh as a Circular & Parcel Delivery Agency. Possibly they saw the success of Robert Brydone's Edinburgh and Leith Circular & Parcel Delivery Companies in 1865.

Only one stamp design was used but of two alternating transfer types, Type I of 25mm width and Type II of 23½mm width. Whilst there is no value on the stamps it is understood the value was one farthing

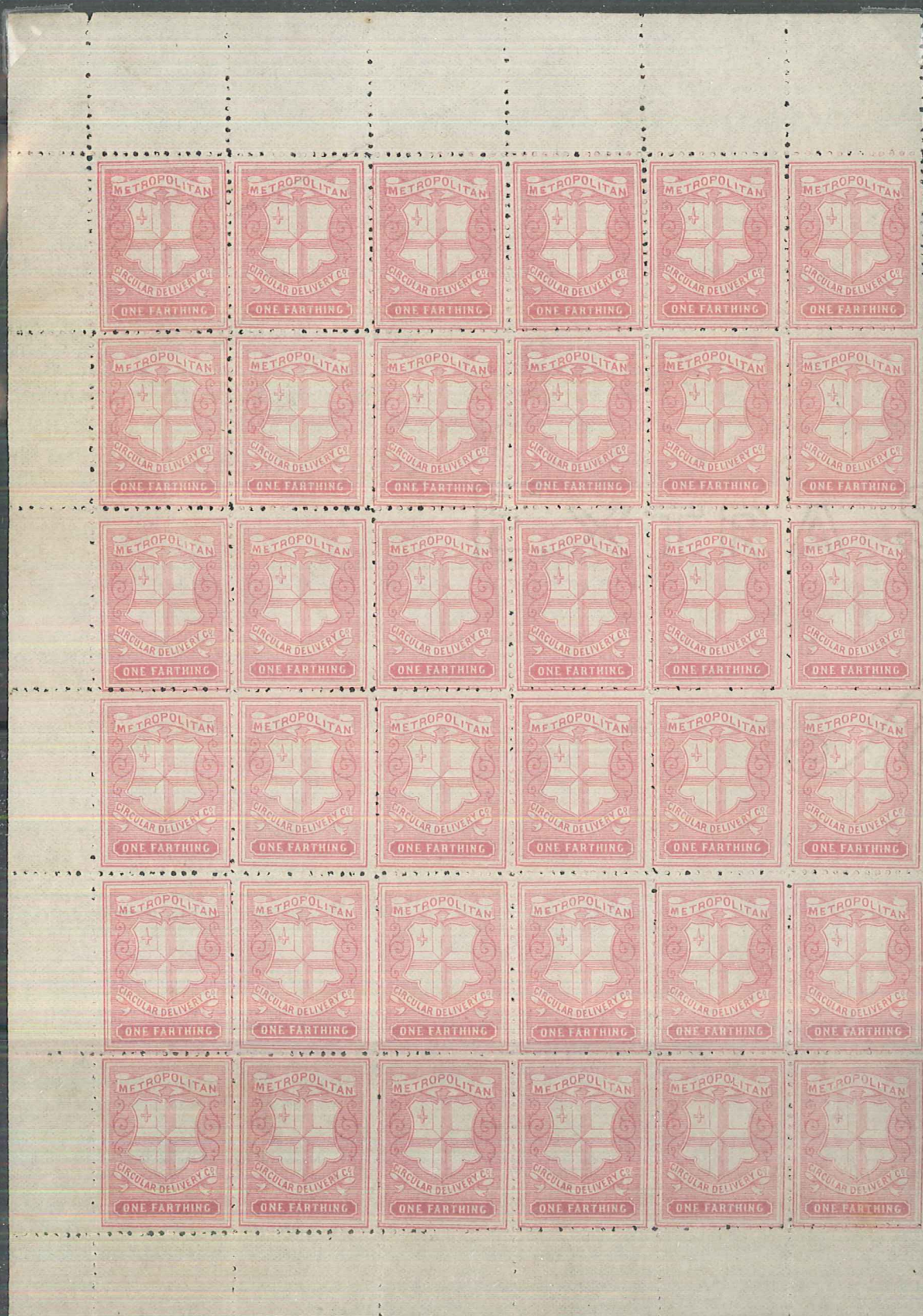
Error of colour, row of one farthing stamps is sheet of one half penny ie claret instead of yellow/green. Example show normal and error stamps together.
