













who was a special constable during World War I, written on March 14, 1916.


"Dear Arthur, Just got yours, it's jolly funny I posted a few lines to you yesterday, "great minds etc." I expect. Heard the Zeps did some damage, but they certainly did more than I expected, from your letter, the club has been pretty lucky, with no heap of miss (?). We play an awful lot of poker here, and I'm up and down all the time. Bet the Petlys don't care for ..., Miss Pought to ... a baby alright. Sorry to hear all ... can't find a woman, it's jolly rotten luck for him. "This is the hell of a pen". I want to sell my

car as I get no time to use it now, as I am Assistant Adjutant here and it's all work. Ireland is some country. In Dublin when they play the King in the theatre they hiss like the devil. But England must be bad if they allow Sandwich boards for protesting against compulsion. Glad to hear "Dad" is getting on alright and doesn't worry about Zep raids at all. Things are pretty good here, only I want to flatten on the Zep. All the best, old man, Harry".
