ITEM DESCRIPTION

1840 1d black MJ on cover obliterated by a Maltese Cross and a Red London Tombstone.

OBSERVATIONS

Comparisons with the letter positions and descriptions in Nissen indicate that the stamp is from Plate 4.

The cover was sent from Brighton (c.d.s. 2[6?] July 1840) to London. The stamp is obliterated by a Maltese Cross in a mixture of red and black inks, and a Red London Inland Office morning duty Paid Tombstone dated 27 July 1840. The relatively light impression of the cross or the mixture of inks possibly prompted the London clerk to place his Tombstone over the stamp. The cover also shows a Brighton Type 'd' Uniform Penny Post mark in red.

PROVENANCE

CONCLUSION

In my opinion, the cover bears an 1840 1d Black MJ Plate 4 obliterated by a Maltese Cross in mixed Red and Black inks and a Red London Paid Tombstone, and is genuine. SG Spec. AS23(var.).
