



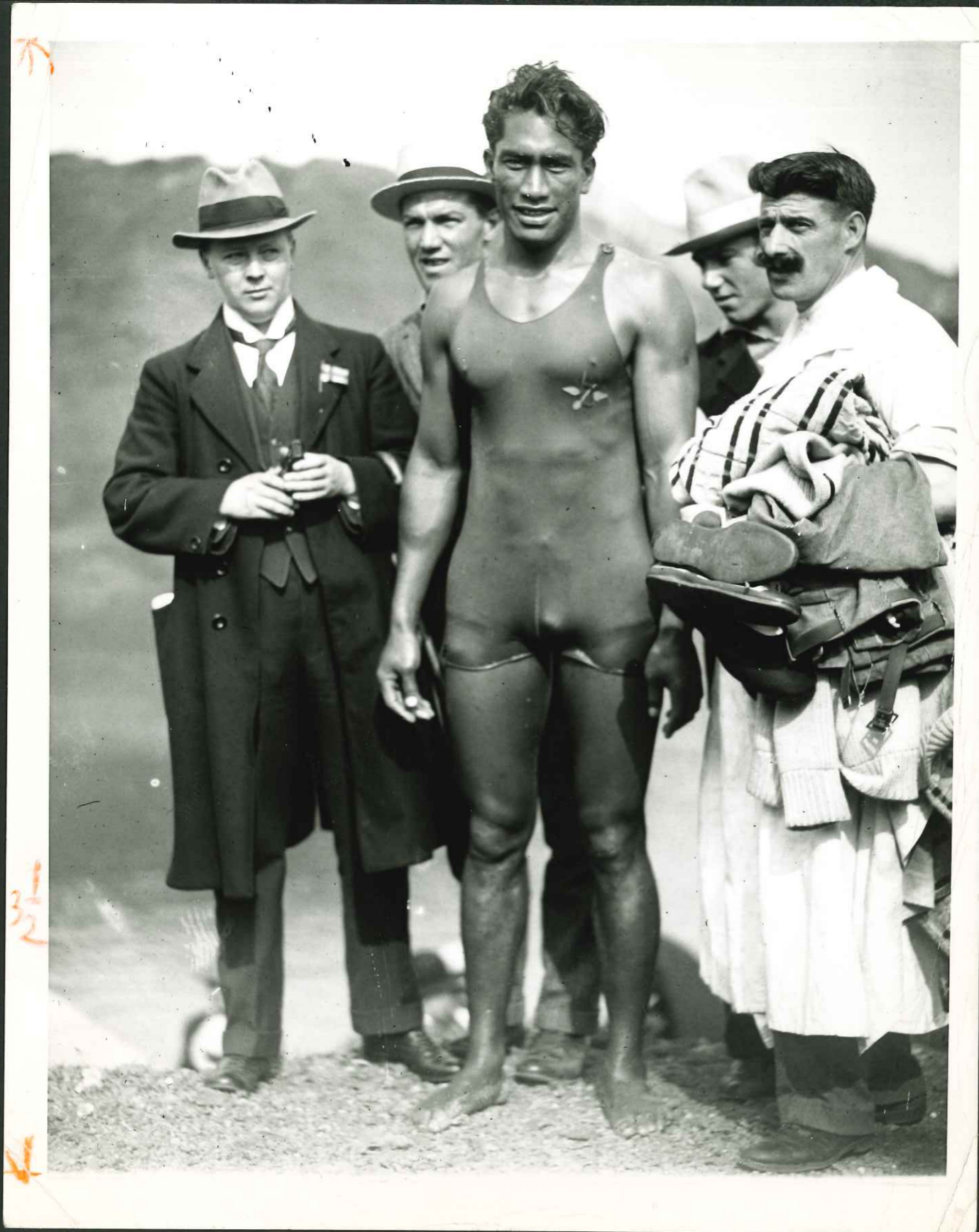


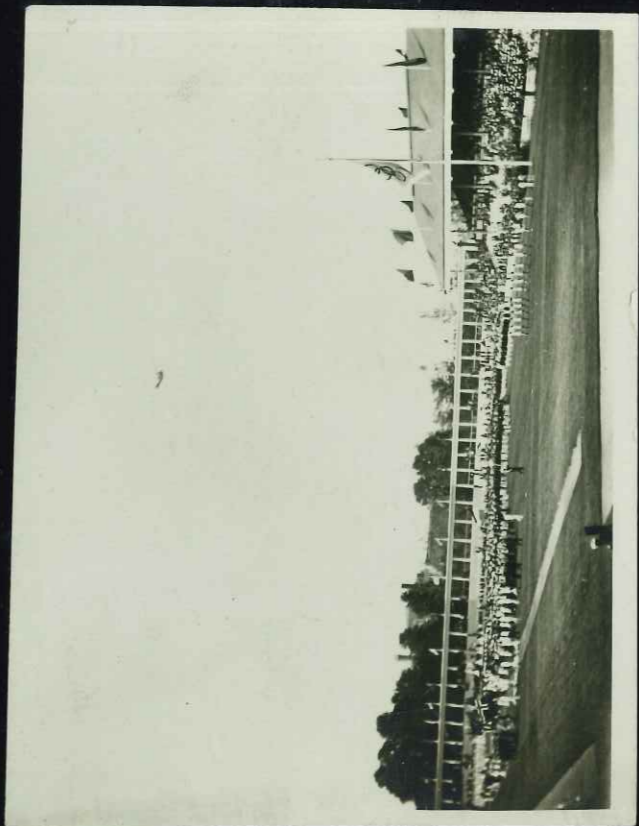

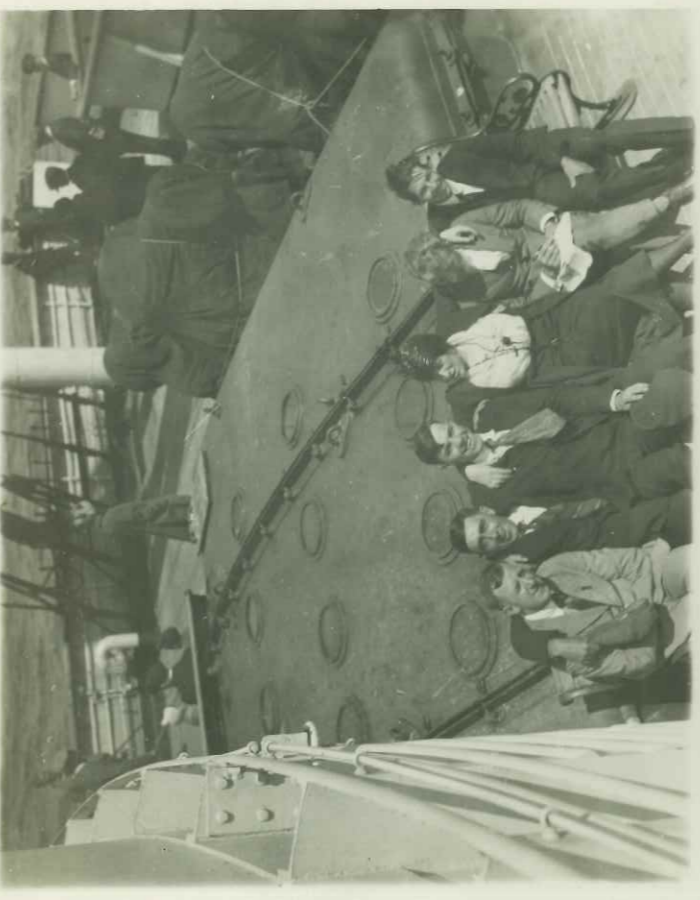
DUKE KAHANAMOKU, GEORGE CENTER, MANAGER OF

AMERICAN YACHT LEADING WHEN WIND FAILS

Over Thousand
Making Cruise

According to a statement issued from the executive office last night there are 1,098 persons aboard. Six hundred and seventy nine of these are of the Naval Reserve force and are assigned for training. The regular Navy compliment numbers 225. The total for the Olympic team including coaches and trainers is 101; total crew 74. There are 14 civilians aboard, chiefly representatives of press and film services.

This cruise is the first duty for the Frederick since she was placed on a re-mission status in July 1919. At the time of the war she was ordered to South American waters.

Temporary duty there she performed the duty of escorting transports. After the armistice she was fitted for transport duty and assisted in bringing back the Army of Occupation.

The U. S. S. Frederick was originally the U. S. S. Maryland but was later forced to surrender this name to the dreadnaught by that name. She carries an armament of four 8 inch, four 6-inch, ten 3-inch and two 3-inch anti aircraft guns. In addition to these there are 2 submerged torpedo tubes. This armament is protected by and three inches stem and stern.

The length of the Frederick at her waterline is 502 ft., her beam is 62 1/2 feet. Her motive power is furnished by two sets of vertiole triple expansion engines. Her coal capacity is 2068 tons with a consumption rate of 100 tons per day.

Calm Robs Resolute
of Victory over English
Challenger

FINAL RACE TODAY

Sandy Hook—The fifth and decisive race between the yachts Resolute and Shamrock IV was begun here today in a gentle breeze but was never finished because it died out so completely that both captain's were unable to proceed. At this time the American yacht had taken the lead by more than a half mile in spite of a 50 second handicap in crossing the starter line. The Shamrock was gradually diminishing this difference however in proportion as the wind decreased. A record of the race is being kept by the U. S. S. Frederick. The spectators were disappointed to see the race run Tuesday.

PREMIERS REJECT DEMAND TO PROTECT POLAND.

BOULOGNE—Premiers Lloyd George and Millerand determined to reject the Soviet demand for a conference unless Bolsheviki reversed their present attitude and agreed to discuss peace with Poland, and that all qualified representatives of the Russian Border states should attend. The two Premiers will lay down conditions necessary for the recognition of the Soviets. This attitude is taken to protect Poland.

FROM THE BRIDGE.

The Frederick's position at 8 o'clock this morning is 40 deg., 34 min. N. latitude, 53 deg., 33 min., W longitude. The distance from Newport is 802 miles, from Antwerp 2883 miles. The Matoika this morning is 100 miles astern of us and making approximately the same course and speed. We will continue today through the fringe of the Newfoundland fog bank. The nebula percentage, however will be slight.

WHO'S WHO AMONG THE OLYMPIANS ON BOARD

A review of the personnel of the Navy's Olympic team reveals little but ability. Of the divers Lieut. (j.g.) Frank A. Mullen U. S. N. perhaps has the most brilliant record. He was third choice for the American Olympic Team in fancy diving in 1912 and has taken in all seven American Diving Championships. Lieut. G. F. Dunn, U.S.N.R.F. and Machinist's Mate R. H. Beauchamp, U. S. N. will do fancy and plain diving. Midshipmen Fish, Winjaker, Bollins, Emory, Lamdin and Seaman Kacher of Honolulu go as extras.

The three qualified boxers on the team are George D. Eichel, Ege featherweight, winner of the New York Metropolitan Championship March 25, 1916 from Abraham Goldstein and holds the Fleet Belt for his weight; John R. Grant, OGM, heavy-weight, holder of the Pacific Coast Amateur Championship; Steven Mutsche, private Marine Corps, middleweight champion of the Atlantic Fleet. The boxing extras include Ensign Scheil, PhM R., Hospital App., McMullen, CMM Henricks and Seaman Wies, Morgenovick, Duarte and Day.

The wrestling squad is headed by Lieut Commander P. V. H. Weems who after a brilliant Athlete career at the Academy was graduated in 1912. He was champion in light & heavy wrestling for three years and in his second year received the Athletic Sword. Lieut. (j.g.) John R. Redman graduated and won the middleweight wrestling championship from the Academy in 1918. He also holds championships from five other Colleges. Midshipman Edward E. Willkie, for three years on the wrestling team at the Academy, was the heavy-weight champion there this year. The Graeco Roman wrestlers are: Ensign Daniel V. Gallery, graduated from the Academy in June 1920 and qualified for the 125 lbs class; Ensign Frank Maiehe, heavyweight champion of the Academy 1918 and Captain of the wrestling team 1919; Midshipman O. R. Swigart winner of the Academy championship in the 135 pound class 1918 and Captain of the wrestling team 1920. and Private W. J. Welch of the Marine Corps Winner of Pacific Fleet Championship in 1916 and never thrown by his own weight. The extra wrestlers include: Lieut. Edward B. Rogers of the Academy Wrestling team and former Coach of Wrestling on the U. S. S. Arizona. Lieut. H. H. Anderson Academy Champion in lightweight wrestling in 1918; and Private Cornelius Cornelius Marine Corps, wrestling Champion of Virginia Islands 1917 and Charleston, S. C. 1919. The Bulletin tomorrow will carry a write up of the Navy's Olympic Crew.
