

Registered Mail.

Whilst the Military Postal Concession was free, registered mail had to be prepaid at a rate of 2d.



February 12th 1919. Cover to North Shields from Alexandria with Great Britain 2d. bright orange cancelled by BASE ARMY POST OFFICE-Z datestamp with registered label of same alongside.

Registered Mail.



September 11th 1917. Great Britain registered stationery envelope, 2d. black, used to Cairo cancelled by the British ARMY POST OFFICE-SZ 17 datestamp applied at Kantara. Reverse with Sidi Gaber and Cairo arrival datestamps.



January 24th 1918. The same envelope used to Alexandria from Ramleh, cancelled ARMY POST OFFICE-SZ 18 datestamp.

Note that both envelopes bear blank Registration labels and are Censored.

Whilst normal mail was free, registration had to be paid for.

The build up of Allied Forces in Egypt began prior to the Dardanelles Campaign.

British, Indian, South African and ANZAC Troops used Egypt
as a staging post in the operation.

November 24th 1915. Postcard to Birmingham carried free under Military concession cancelled by violet 'LUXOR CONVALESCENT DEPOT' cachet and Egyptian Luxor datestamp.

September 25th 1917. Stampless Military concession cover to Carmarthen, Wales from the British Red Cross Hospital at Giza. Triangular Censor cachet over-struck by British ARMY POST OFFICE-SZ 10 datestamp of Base Office, Cairo.

1936. First Day Cover with 10m. carmine.



March 1st 1936. First Day Cover bearing Army Post 10m. carmine cancelled by "Military Post Office-Abu Qir" datestamp.

Due to the overwhelming demand for stamps to be used by the British Forces in Egypt at concessionary rates to the UK, an issue was prepared for the 1 piastre rate; designed by Lieutenant Colonel C. Fraser, the stamps were typographed by Hanbury, Tomsett & Company in Willesden, London.

Issued on November 1st 1932, the 'NAAFI' issue was initially inscribed 'Postal Seal'.

The issued stamp.
One printing of 500,000 stamps.

The stamps were printed in sheets of 80 subjects, divided into panes of 20 and stapled into Booklets of five panes prior to delivery.

1932. I piastre deep blue and red.

Block of eight used with 'retta' cancellation in black.

1933. 1 Piastre 'Letter Seal'.

The design was changed to read 'Letter Seal' instead of 'Postal Seal' in deference to Egypt's postal sovereignty.

Issued in August 1933, the new stamps were printed in sheets of 20 to facilitate the stapling into Booklets of complete panes.

Typographed by Hanbury, Tomsett and Company of Willesden, London.

No watermark. Perforated 11.

1 Piastre 'Letter Seal' on cover.



April 4th 1934. Cover to London from Cairo franked on reverse as per regulations for the Postal Concession with 1 piastre value (position 15 with diagonal line across "E" of "SEAL") cancelled by black 'retta'.

Front shows Cairo-Military Post Office datestamp and red Crown 'Egypt-Postage Prepaid-No.6' cachet.

On June 1st 1934 a new design was issued after Essays had been sent by a Miss Waugh from Cairo to Harrison's in London. The design showed the Sphinx and retained the words 'Letter Stamp' instead of 'Postage Stamp' in the inscription.

Photogravure by Harrison's of London. Printed in plates of 40 stamps, stapled into Booklets comprising five panes of 20. 250,000 stamps were printed, and amount insufficient for a full year.

No watermark. Perforated 141/2x14.

A new stamp was ordered as sales were so high, and the same stamp was issued in green on December $5^{\rm th}$ 1934.

1937. Cover with 1935 1 piastre and 1936 10m.



May 12th 1937. Coronation Day illustrated cover showing King George VI and Queen Mary franked by 1936 1 piastre carmine (perforated 13½x14) and Army Post 1936 10m. carmine cancelled at the Military Post Office in Cairo.

1935. British Forces in Egypt-Jubilee Seal.

1935. Jubilee Seal.

To commemorate the Silver Jubilee the 1 piastre carmine, perforated 13½x14 of April 1935 was reprinted in bright ultramarine and surcharged diagonally in red with 'Jubilee Commemoration 1935'.

The stamp was issued on May 6th and only 27,000 were printed.

Whilst this number seems substantial, all countries of the British Empire celebrated the Jubilee with a stamp issue and this was the lowest printing any Jubilee issue.

Typographed overprint by Harrison & Sons of London.

1935. British Forces in Egypt-Jubilee Seal.

Jubilee Seal on First Day Cover.



May 6th 1935. First Day Cover bearing overprinted 1 piastre bright ultramarine cancelled by 'retta' in black with datestamps of Abu Qir and Alexandria alongside and 'Egypt-Postage Prepaid-No.14' on front in red.

1935. British Forces in Egypt-Provisional Christmas Seal.

On December 16th 1935 a provisionally overprinted Christmas Seal was issued with 'Xmas 1935 - 3 Milliemes' overprint in black applied on the perforated 13½x14 April 1935 1 piastre carmine.

This provisional overprint was applied to just 9'920 stamps. All were sold. It must be presumed that the overprint was applied by Walker& Co at the Amalgamated Press.

December 17th 1935. Cover to Leicester from Cairo franked on reverse with 1935 provisional 3m. on 1pi. carmine cancelled by black 'retta'. Front bears Military Post Office-Cairo datestamp and 'Egypt-Postage Prepaid-No.19' cachet in red.

Army Post Issue.

The Army Post issues featured a central vignette of King Fuad and were printed by photogravure at the Survey Department, Cairo.

The issue was based on the high values of the Fuad issue of 1927-37 and inscribed 'Army Post' in the left hand panel. Two stamps were issued, a 3m green for the Christmas card or unsealed letter rate, and a 10m value in carmine for letter postage.

December 19th 1936. 3m green on Christmas card cover to Edinburgh cancelled by Military Post Office-Cairo datestamp.

Two 3m green on 1939 postcard to England.



November 26th 1939. Postcard to Bognor Regis from General Hospital, Cairo. Franked by two 3m green cancelled British Post Office-Cairo datestamp with framed 'Passed By Unit Censor-31' violet cachet alongside.

The 3m value was issued for the unsealed letter rate or Christmas card, there was no specific stamp for a postcard rate although the Egyptian tariff was 6 milliemes, thus the unusual use of two 3m values on a postcard.

Interesting message: "Came here three days after War was declared...

I hope the postmark will tell you where I am as I can't..."

Control Blocks.

Control A/36, first printing. Control A/38, second printing. Control B/39 on A/39 on A/38, fourth printing.

On December 12th 1939 a second Army Post issue was released with the somewhat tardy replacement of King Farouk in the vignette for the late King Fuad.

Again these were printed by photogravure at the Survey Department, Cairo.

February 6th 1940. Airmail cover to London franked by 10m. carmine and Egypt 1933 30m. Airmail cancelled by British Post Office-E602 (Cairo) datestamp. Violet 'Passed By Unit Censor-46' cachet at left.

During the Second World War the Military Postal Concession for free mail was again applied.



November 20th 1942. Engraved 'Shepheard's Hotel, Cairo' envelope endorsed 'OAS' (On Active Service) used to Alexandria cancelled by Egypt-Postage Prepaid-102 datestamp of Cairo. Passed Censor in violet alongside.



October 15th 1942. Official OHMS envelope to Alexandria cancelled by 'CASHIER-ADMIRALTY BASE-ALEXANDRIA' datestamp in blue.

'If not delivered within 8 days return to: Admiralty Cashier, HM Naval Base, Alexandria' cachet in red.

1932-35. British Forces in Egypt-Christmas Seals.

1935. 3m. vermilion.

The Christmas Seal for 1935 was issued in vermilion and again was a 3 millieme value.

Due to a build up of British Forces in Egypt, all of the November 23rd initial printing of 101,100 were sold.

A new printing was made in a paler shade of vermilion and issued on December 19th 1935.

Printed in sheets of 20, lithographed by Walker & Co at the Amalgamated Press in Cairo.

No watermark. Perforated 111/2.

December 6th 1935. Cover to Kenton, Middlesex from Moascar with first printing 3m vermilion on reverse, cancelled by Military Post Office-Moascar datestamp. Front bears 'Egypt-Postage Prepaid-No.4' cachet in red.
