



INTRODUCTION

History and tradition of this mysterious Asian country on top of the Himalaya mountains between China and India would fill more than one book and cannot be part of this brief introduction. Even the philatelic story is very difficult and unusual, same as the country and its people...

Tibetan stamps have been issued from 1912 after the first Chinese occupation until the early 1950s before the second, and ongoing Chinese occupation. Since 1959, when the last Tibetan Post Office had to close, only Chinese stamps are valid in Tibet. In those ca 40 years of free and independent Tibet, only three definitive sets with a total of 13 basic stamps have been issued plus some Officials and Telegraph Stamps. All of them were hand printed with simple wooden printing blocks on local handmade paper in small sheets of six, nine or twelve stamps only.

Tibetan stamps have no watermark, gum or perforation. They were cut with scissors at the post office and had to be sticked on covers with ordinary paper glue. It was attempt to perforate the stamps, but it didn't work with the handmade paper. This natural paper was used for the stamps over the whole period and varied from strong brownish packing paper type which was also used for envelopes, to extremely thin and almost transparent rice paper in natural off-white and ivory colour shades. Many varieties are also existing in the hand carved wooden printing blocks and the natural colours that were used over the years. Most stamps exist in all possible shades of the basic colours red, blue, green and yellow plus some very different proofs and colour trials. Colours were usually matt and dull. Glossy colours were only used from 1950 onwards.

It was easy to print fake copies of Tibetan stamps with no watermark and perforation and is quite difficult even for experts to distinguish between genuine stamps and good forgeries. There also might be some forgeries found in this collection as one cannot get certificates for each end every stamp... The traditional design of Tibetan stamps shows always the National Emblem, the Tibetan Snow Lion in the centre, surrounded by ornaments of Tibetan art and calligraphic letters and numbers.

The face value on the stamps is showing always Tibetan numbers and is not visible for foreigners. Only the words: "Tibet", "Postage" and "Stamp" are showing in English, same as the earlier postmarks.

The Tibetan currency Trangka is extremely complicated to understand. For example the six stamps of the first definitive set was issued in the following denominations: 1/6 Trangka (=equivalent to 1 Khasang), 1/3 Trangka (=1 Karmanga), ½ Trangka (=1 Tshaky), 2/3 Trangka (= 1 Shokang), 1 Trangka, and as the highest value 1 Sang (= 6 2/3 Trangka). Find also a table of Tibetan currency and numbers at the bottom.

You see how much fun it can be and how confusing it is as a philatelist and collector of Tibetan stamps. Indeed a science on its own which need to be studied comprehensively before starting a collection...





























TWO ENTIRES FROM TIBET OF THE PRE-STAMP PERIOD BEFORE 1912 ARE SHOWN ON THIS PAGE

















China says 'no' to Austrian Dalai Lama stamp

Austria Post has been forced to abort plans to issue a stamp designed to honour the Dalai Lama due to pressure from the Chinese government. The design included a portrait of the Tibetan Buddhist spiritual leader in his traditional orange robes, and bore the inscription: 'His Holiness the Dalai Lama'. Chinese authorities strongly disapproved of the stamp, and the project was quickly abandoned to avoid damaging economic relations between the two countries. 00%




