





# The "Named" Military Datestamps

M.P.O Abu Qir



A series of 21 such military post office cancellers was in use for at least part of the period of the Postal Concession.



This short-lived datestamp has been recorded in use only from March to December 1936

# Named Military Datestamps

M.P.O Abbassia



Cover sent from Paris Gare Saint Lazare with 3fr 50 franking to Cairo in 1932. The receiver on the reverse is the earliest recorded of only 4 known - it is only used as a backstamp.

# The Postal Concession

## The "Named" Military Datestamps M.P.O. Abbassia



"Only one example of the M.P.O. Abbassia datestamp has been recorded and that an incomplete strike" - Minett/Firebrace in Q.C. Vol V 1960. This is that item, since when two more have been recorded, all struck on the reverse as receiver marks.

Postal seal cover to R.A.O.C. London from M.P.O. Cairo 14 AU 33, re-addressed R.A.O.C. Abbassia, Cairo and posted London SW on AUG 21, received transit M.P.O. Cairo dated 28 AU 33 and the next day the receiving mark on arrival at M.P.O. Abbassia.





Suez Canal area (iv)



For use by the RAF at Abu Sueir, the RAF Ismailia and the Army at Moascar, and both the Army and Royal Navy at the Navy House at Port Said. The earlier Moascar date-stamp may have been cast down a well on 6th March 1933.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps

## Civilian Cancellations

Civilian cancellations on Army Post stamps are listed by Hobbs from only three main towns, Alexandria, Cairo & Port Said; suburban offices (above) are also encountered.



Despite the airmail etiquette this is a surface rate cover posted at Ras el-Tin, the suburb of Alexandria where the royal Summer Palace was located. The reverse of the cover has Alexandria Arrival transit date stamp.





# Fuad Army Post Stamps civilian date-stamps

The military post office at Abu Qir having closed on 24<sup>th</sup> January 1937, mail was taken to the civilian office by a RAF orderly, where the military stamp received a civilian cancellation. The Egyptian postal services were used in this way until 1<sup>st</sup> May 1940, some twenty months into World War II.


# Fuad Army Post Stamps

civilian date-stamps  
curved Abu Qir

The military post office at Abu Qir opened on the 1st March 1936 (when the Fuad 10 milles Army Post stamps was issued) and it closed on 24th January 1937.



".... all correspondence for the R.A.F. at Abu Qir will be dealt with by the civil post office at that place.... An orderly from the R.A.F. at Abu Qir must collect and deliver from and to the civil post office at Abu Qir."



Surface 10 milles rate cover sent Abu Qir to London with civilian Abu Qir date-stamp 24 AUG 39 - this is one of two date-stamps of this area near Alexandria and is the much less common of the two civil types.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps

Against regulations?

The circular datestamp of the Abu Sueir civil post office dated 22 MR 39 6.50P struck on the reverse of the cover below; this office incorrectly struck the boxed T on the front thus alerting the Inland Section in London to stamp the 3d tax duly collected at Chepstow by the three 1d dues attached. As the cover was correctly franked and posted, such tax should not have been charged unless of course the cover was overweight.



Letter correctly franked 10 mills Fuad Army Post stamp correctly posted in military box, evidenced by MPO Abu Sueir struck in blue. Despite this, a civilian office struck the boxed T resulting in incorrect collection of threepence tax at Chepstow.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps

Against regulations?

Correctly posted in the military post box at M.P.O. Cairo, franked 10 millimes surface rate, this cover received the taxe mark that alerted the postal clerk of the Inland Section to stamp 3d and affix 3d due cancelled at the destination at Manchester. Was the item overweight?



Insurance book cover to Manchester dated 11 JA 39 correctly franked for surface mail unless it weighed over 20 grammes.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps

Royal Navy Mail and a letter sent from a troopship



Above: cover from a ship of the Royal Navy franked 40m for airmail with 81 dot tettas, Naval censors back and front.



Cover posted on board S.S. Rawalpindi with boxed cachet franked 10m for surface mail cancelled at Malta with paquebot datestamp and Alexandria receiver on back.



# Fouad Army Post Stamps

## Faked cover

"Although the date of issue for this 3 mills Fouad Army Post stamp is given by various catalogues (Stanley Gibbons, Teneri etc.) as "9th November 1936" the Official Notice of 13th November 1936 clearly states that the stamp was placed on sale from the "1st December 1936". Charles Hass in Chalhoub's "The Nile Post" on page 633.



# Farouk Army Post Stamps



Although King Fouad died on 28<sup>th</sup> April 1936, it was not until 16<sup>th</sup> December 1939 that the large Army Post stamps were replaced by those of Farouk. Accordingly, by early December there was a shortage of the 3 millimes value for Christmas.



Military unsealed cover to London from Cairo franked 4 millimes civilian stamp cancelled 2 DE 39 by M.P.O. 601 type 1 at Cairo.



As Commonwealth troops arrived in Egypt, at the start of the war, the Australian, Indian and New Zealand forces used the new smaller Farouk Army Post stamps, though though the South African forces seemingly came too late.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps


Printed in sheets of 100, watermarked multiple royal cypher, these were based on the 1927-31 definite issue of Egypt issued by the Egyptian Postal Administration. As a result, a sheet of stamps from each plate put to press was sent to the king who retained them. So, 'Royal' imperforates cancelled on reverse, as well as 'Royal' misperforates, exist for each of the values.

# Fuad Army Post Stamps

1st December 1936

For use on unsealed envelopes for greetings cards from the 1st December and withdrawn on 15th February 1937, to be re-issued each winter during 1937, 1938, 1939, even 1940.



"There is a faint 'dribble of colour' from the left leg of 'A' (arrowed); overall length of A/36 is 9.5mm. (Whether) in advising existence of two paces contra Hobbs' one frame."

# The Postal Concession

13th May 1937

Following the abdication of his older brother King Edward VIII, the Duke of York was crowned King George VI and reigned, together with his Queen Elizabeth, now the Queen Mother, until his death in 1952. He was succeeded by his older daughter Elizabeth who became Elizabeth II.




A first day cover especially printed for the coronation and posted from M.P.O. Cairo doubly franked with both 'old' and 'new' adhesives. On the reverse is a sender's handstamp which reads: 'If not delivered return to Gen. Staff H.Q., B.T.E. Cairo.'

# THE ARMY POST STAMPS

Egypt, having raised its postage rates in 1932, agreed a scheme whereby troops could post letters home at the old rates. In March 1936 the scheme was amended - see poster below - and the Army Post stamps, bearing the portraits of Kings Fuad and his son Farouk, were printed and issued by Egypt for use of British troops. Unlike the N.A.A.F.I. seals these were affixed to fronts of covers.





# Egypt Postage Prepaid

## Base Army Post Office 4

From 3rd April 1941 this base office was located at Cairo; it was the transit office for much EPP mail and is usually found only on the reverse of covers.





F.P.O. E609 was never used in Egypt but Australian forces used it at Hill 69 in Palestine; E613 and E614 seem never to have been issued as none have ever been recorded. All the above base and field post offices were stationary.

# The Postal Concession

"On Active Service" Christmas Air Mail



Two examples of this very short-lived arrangement; top ex-F.P.O. 171, RAF Heliopolis, originated 7-DE-40 from a naval vessel with tomastone censor au verso; bottom from F.P.O. 188 at Abbassia, Cairo. Smith statement only partially correct as the service clearly applied to Christmas airmail.

# The Postal Concession

Christmas mail 1940

With the too late availability of the new Farouk stamps for the 1939 Christmas mail, the Fuad stamps were once more issued for the 1940 Christmas mail as they had been for the three preceding years; latest recorded are those below.

The latest recorded use of the Fuad 3 mills on cover 22 OC 40 cancelled FPO 171 at RAF Heliopolis with Chief Field Censor cachet in purple (also known in green or blue) to Sheffield.

# The Postal Concession

"On Active Service" Christmas Air Mail

Recorded 4 days only between 6th and 9th December 1940

Air-mail cover sent from a Royal Navy ship by G.P.S. Hill - see boxed Naval censor 257 - transferred to FPO 71 at RAF Heliopolis to catch the free Christmas Air Mail 1940.

# The Postal Concession

## End of the Concession?

Outside the dates, 6th to 9th December 1940, of the one-off Christmas Air Mail, this cover was cancelled at F.P.O. 172 based at Alexandria. It is likely to have arrived there from the Western Desert where stamps were often unobtainable, or was posted on a troopship.



Censored (Proud type C, double boxed 118) cover posted unfranked to Birmingham; the F.P.O. 172 is Alexandria transit as posted either Western Desert or on a troopship.


## The Postal Concession

The End of the Concession, or not?

"Free franking for surface letters was introduced on November 1st 1940" P.A.S. Smith 'Egypt Stamps and Postal History' p. 719.

"possibly early in December, the Postal Concession was cancelled, as all mail from the forces was carried free." Hobbs p.75

Neither of the above gives a source but, seemingly, in late 1940 a temporary arrangement enabled troops to send Christmas mail free of postage, for a limited period only.




Letter without franking but marked 'On Active Service' posted at F.P.O. 170, R.A.F. Station Heliopolis, to Liskeard in Cornwall on 19th November 1940 vindicating Peter Smith. The censor signed cover has Hobbs' army censor type A1 with the number 2414 neatly struck in purple with royal crown.

## Army Post stamps used in Greece

Top cover bears 40 mills airmail rate, but stamps not cancelled; but on reverse is O.H.M.S. label stating "From F/Lt. J.H.L. Newnham Medical Officer H.Q. RAF Greece". RAF Conscript no. 114

# Farouk Army Post Stamps

Army Post stamps used internally in Egypt

Though posted correctly at F.P.O. 189, signed and censored by Army censor Hobbs type D numbered 169, and manuscript "On Active Service", this cover was still against regulations as it was addressed internally within Egypt to Port Said F.P.O. 189 was 5 Line of Communication Postal Unit with Headquarters 7th Armoured Division until November '42.

The postage rate for an internal civilian letter to 30 grams rose from 5 mills to 6 mills w.e.f. 11th July 1940 so it is the correct rate but here made up using two Farouk Army Post stamps against regulations; to date this seems unique usage.

# Farouk Army Post Stamps

Airmail rate of 40 millimes (actually 41) made up using seven three millimes Farouk Army Post stamps dated 6 AP 41 from F.P.O. 190 at Cairo; unit censor 100 and Chief Field Censor.

One of two covers sent on the same date to the same addressee from B.P.O. E.602 at Alexandria; they are the earliest recorded correct usages of the 3 millimes stamp, although philatelic.



# Farouk Army Post Stamps

The 3 millieme value was issued 16th December 1939, too late for its use on overseas Christmas mail; it was mostly held back until mid-October 1940 contrived and cancelled by favour.







Block of dark shade Farouk Army Post stamps cancelled unusually in blue early in the Australian loan period on an 'honour' cover censored box 266 to Melbourne dated 7 AP 41.







