


Sample of BONC Cancel

Approximately 500 Post Offices in the Cape Province were issued with the Thick bar obliterator by 1865. Nine groupings are known, above are shown only three as a sample.

Watermarks

All stamps produced in London by Perkins, Bacon & Petch as well as by De La Rue are printed on Watermark Paper. The watermark shows an <u>Anchor</u> with the bottom pointing to the base line of the stamp. Sometimes the anchor may be slightly moved to the right or left of the stamp. The printing sheet of the 240 stamps were surrounded by 5 parallel lines and within this line the word <u>Postage</u> was written once on the bottom and the top of the sheet and twice on each side.



Sideways watermarks exists where the sheet has been inserted turned by 90 degree. In this cases the anchor is only seen half along the bottom line of the stamp.

In 1864 De La Rue used by mistake a few sheets for printed with the watermark Crown CC
