Penny Posts.

The Trish Penny Post has an interesting history which is described fully by F. W. Meredith in his handbook Old Trish Postage Stamps and Franks. It may bee briefly summarized as follows: 11 th October 1773. Established in Dublin for letters not exceeding to oz. in weight for delivery within the City boundaries, 18 Receiving Houses were opened in different parts of the City where letters could be posted. The 1th for postage had to be prepaid, and thus differed from the General Postal Service, in which prepayment was optional. There were two deliveries daily 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. The service was extended to the environs 1774. of the City not exceeding 4 miles. 1818. The number of Receiving Houses were increased to 53, and prepayment was abolished except at the Chief Penny Post Office. Deliveries were increased to four, 8-30 a.m. 12 noon, 3 p.m. 9 6 p.m. 1832 Tenny Posts were established outside Dublin and by 1837 over 200 were in existence.

Dublin Penny Post. 1773-1840

The Dublin Penny Post Office was established in this building on 10th October 1773 and remained there until Manuary 1818 on which day it was transferred to the new 9.90. in Sackville Street.

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
Dublin Two penny Post Area.
Summary of Facts based on Memorundum by M. F. E. Dixon dated September 1962. A post system was established in the year 1773 with the title "The Dublin Penny Post Office." This system initially served only the immediate vicinity of Dublin - prepayment compulsory. In 1774 it spread & letters from Dublin to the "outer region" charged 1th on posting plus a second 1th on delivery. Later it became permissible to prepay the 2d, but the main function was to supply delivery of General Post Letters outside the city area. For this only 1d was charged. The fact that it was the Penny Post Office explains why Kingston & were issued with a Penny Post stamp. ENNISKERRY TWOPENNY POST is probably unique. The Two penny Post section of Dublin Runy Post is "difficult" to segregate in that the boundary varied, sothat the same office could at different times be in the farea Tin the 2ª area. Portobello Hotel is the best example of this. The MAP of the DUBLIN TWOPENNY POSTS in the 1838 House of Commons Report is incomplete in that before the year was out there were further offices at Celbridge, Teixlip, Karolds Cross, Rathmines, Stillorgan, Cabinteely V Delgany.

Dublin Two Tenny Post 1774-1840

The Dublin Two Penny Post was instituted in the year

* 1774. There were at first 13 Receiving Houses outside
the city proper (Vide Meredith "Olde Prish Postage Ramps
and Franks" page 40) Later these were increased in number
and the radius of collection and delivery much extended.
The Third Report of the Select Committee on Bestage 1838
contains a sketch plan of 24 Receiving Houses extending
in various directions from the city.
