THE following Addresses and Resolutions of Condolence, on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness The Prince Consort, have been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, to be laid before the Queen.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Society for the Encouragement of Arts, Manufactures, and Commerce, incorporated by royal charter, humbly approach your Majesty with the assurance of our devoted attachment to your throne and person, and of our respectful sympathy with your Majesty in the great affliction which has so unexpectedly befallen your Majesty and the nation in the early death of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort.

Whilst the death of a Prince, distinguished by rare intellectual gifts and eminent virtues, is deeply lamented by all classes of your Majesty's subjects, his loss is especially deplored by this Society, which has for many years enjoyed the great advantage of his judicious counsel and support.

His Royal Highness was elected President in 1843.

His high position, his refined tastes, his enlightened judgment, and his candour, his great command of general principles, and his power of applying them to details, and his special knowledge on a great variety of subjects, extended the influence, and greatly promoted the objects of the Society—Science, Art, and Literature, were by his judicious patronage constantly introduced to the notice and recommended to the favour of your Majesty.

The great conception of the Exhibition of 1851, with its countless influences on the progress of human industry, was due to His Royal Highness, and in overcoming the difficulties of such a new

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1.—THE Town of Coleraine is situated on the East bank of the River Bann, about four miles from its confluence with the sea; it appears naturally to belong to the County of Antrim,* but the Town, and a large portion of country surrounding it, on the East of the River, form part of the County of Londonderry. This portion, together with a District of an equal extent on the West side of the Bann, is called the Town and Liberties of Coleraine.

General Description.

The Liberties, as defined by the Charter, extend three miles Irish in every direction from the Town; this distance, in some parts, is exceeded; in others the Liberties are not made to extend so far. There are several Parishes and portions of Parishes included in the Liberties; but of these only two, viz. Coleraine and Killowen, contain any part of the Town or Suburbs; the former includes the Town of Coleraine, the latter an extensive Suburb on the West bank of the River, (connected with the Town by a wooden Bridge) called the Waterside and Killowen. There are several landed Proprietors in the Liberties, of which the Irish Society and some of the London Incorporations or Guilds are the principal. The Marquis of Waterford has an extensive Property adjacent to the Town, in perpetuity from one of these Companies.

The Liberties.

The Town is improving and increasing; house-rent is not high, but very steady; vessels of 200 tons can come up close to the Bridge, and discharge their cargoes at the Quay. Trade is considerably improved, owing, it is said, to the improvement of the Harbour at Port Rush, a neighbouring Town within the Liberties, into which vessels, when unable to pass the Bar at the mouth of the Bann, run for shelter; whereas, formerly, they were obliged to run for some more distant port. The Imports are Timber, Iron, Coals, Flax, Hemp, Tallow, Barilla, &c. There is no trade direct to the West Indies; the Exports are Butter, Grain, Bacon and ship Pork, in considerable quantities for a small town. The Manufactures in the Town and immediate neighbourhood are trifling; a few Paper Mills and some small Tanneries. The tenures of Houses are, leases of lives renewable for ever, paying a septennial fine of one year's rent, but nothing at the fall of a life; and leases of 61 years. Originally there were walls surrounding the Town, but these are nearly obliterated and of no consequence with regard to our present inquiry.

2.—A Charter of James I., in the 12th year of his reign, incorporated the Town and Liberties, and gave the privilege to the Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses alone of returning two Representatives to the Irish Parliament. This right had, for many years, been exercised exclusively by them till, in the year 1830, certain Freemen, made in the year 1797, claimed the Right of Voting, which was refused. These Freemen were the only ones on the books of the Corporation; and we believe there had not been any made since that year, except those who had been created Burgesses, and who were not admitted to the freedom till they were so made Burgesses.† In the same year (1830) many of the inhabitants claimed their freedom under the "New Rules" of 1672, on the ground of being resident, and trading in the Town or Liberties; they tendered the required oaths and fees, and, on being rejected, signed a formal protest against this act of the Common
