INDIA TELEGRAPH STAMPS USED IN CEYLON

Prior to 1881 Indian telegraph stamps were used in Ceylon cancelled in large sansserif letters and the date. The letters were too large to fit on one stamp resulting in only portions of the obliteration on a single stamp. Telegraphically used copies generally consist of half a stamp only. The stamps were applied between the message and the receipt portions of the form and cut after cancellation

SURCHARGED CEYLON TELEGRAPH STAMPS

1882-1894 Ceylon used surcharged telegraph stamps in various formats. The stamps were cut in half following cancellation with one portion remaining on the receipt which is typically preserved. Lower portions of the stamps are less common. The known styles and amounts produced are listed below for the stamps displayed.























12c/50c-4 types, 15,600; 20c/50c-5 types, 56,080; 25c/50 Rupees-1 type, 800; 40c/50c-12 types, 29,040 (red) and 4 types, 175,200 black; 40c/1R-3 types, 38000; 60c/1R-15 types, 98,600; 60c/2 ½ R-4 types, 10,640; 80c/1 R-10 types, 63,600; 80c/25R-7 types, 15,400; 5R/25R 2 types, 6400. 






INDIA TELEGRAPH STAMPS OVERPRINTED "CEYLON"
